

APRIL'S CLASSROOM FOCUS

This month students will be examining informational texts to make connections and distinctions between individuals, ideas or events. They will use what they have learned about text structure in 7th grade and apply it to a variety of text when analyzing the author's meaning and purpose.

Students will also begin to explore different topics and learn how to use appropriate search tools. Precise word choice and logic are two key ingredients when looking for information on the Internet. Students will begin to hone their digital literacy skills by looking at a variety of databases available to them through our local libraries and on-line resources.

Ultimately, students will write an informational piece of text based on their own research which demonstrates an understanding of organization through text structure and research, including citation.

Also, throughout the month of April, our students in grades 3-8 will be taking part in ELA MCAS testing. Thank you for supporting their efforts, as this data is critical as we continuously improve instruction to meet the needs of all learners.
