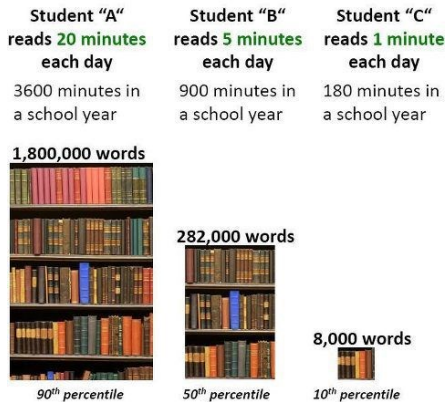
There will be no test or project; it will simply be a time to engage with others around reading. If you don't already know, ask your child which book group they are joining.
